

Aguero is **really** good at scoring goals
Kompany is **really** strong
Bale is **really** fast

We use the word '**really**' to make an adjective stronger

Lewandowski is a **really** good striker!

We often use '**good at + Verb-ing**' when we talk about a skill

Iniesta is really **good at passing!**



Dunne is **too** old, he retired
Mitrovic was **too** aggressive, and got a red card
Jones is **too** lazy

We use the word '**too + adjective**' when something is more than enough, it has a negative meaning

The pitch is **too** wet! (We can't play football here)

The ball was **too** fast for Neuer. (He couldn't get the ball)

The shot was **too** weak. (It was easy for the goalkeeper to save)



Sissoko is **not** hardworking **enough**
Messi is **not** tall **enough** to head the ball
David Silva is **not** strong **enough**

We use the word '*not + adjective enough*' when something is too little, it has a negative meaning

Taylor is **not** quick **enough**. (He is too slow)

He's **not** creative **enough**. (His passing is too boring)

The winger **isn't** skilful enough. (He can't do tricks or dribble well)
